

Foster closet

providing support to foster families

he Foster Closet is a non-profit organization founded by Tammy and John McGuire, whose family is profiled in the cover story of this edition. Their unique organization helps more than 800 children a year in the foster care system, including "pathway teens," older children who have "aged out" of foster care and need supplies as they enter the adult world.

"Through the generous contributions of our community, Foster Closet's inventory is abundant and we rely on a vast network of volun-

teers and donors to access additional donations at a moment's notice," Tammy writes on the website. Clothing donations are carefully sorted by gender, age and size, and made available to children entering foster care. Other items are made available to foster parents and families to prepare their households to receive foster children.

Today, the Foster Closet is a nearly 5,000-square-foot facility staffed with 20-30 volunteers and assisted with support from Family and Children Services (FSS) which pays the rent and keeps the lights on.

According to their website at www.FosterCloset.org, their briefbut-powerful mission statement is "To look after the orphans...James 1:27." The site also provides extensive data about their work, including information about donating, volunteer opportunities, church and other partner organizations, support groups and information on how locals might arrange for speaking engagements to learn more.

The McGuire family feature that begins on page six provides some insight into the background and history of a little idea that has grown into a wonderful resource for thousands. Essentially, the Foster Closet is always in need of material and financial donations to make the following necessities available for children of all sizes from newborn through 18 years old.
